Also available to residents is a little-known trail in the southwest section of our township. Woodlawn Trustees, Incorporated owns and maintains about 2000 acres of land in Brandywine Hundred (Delaware) and Pennsylvania as a wildlife preserve and as open space. A parking lot is located on the south side of Beaver Valley Road; a map is posted on our web site.

GARNET VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT STATION ROAD REALIGNMENT

The School District has contracted for road improvements in conjunction with the recently-constructed Concord Elementary School. Improvements include relocation of Station Road to intersect Smithbridge Road at Bethel Road and the relocation of the middle school entrance to intersect with the new portion of Station Road. A traffic signal will be installed at the intersection of Smithbridge/Station/Bethel Roads. Construction began in mid-March.

ENGINEERING

Projects currently in construction or planned include:

- **Routes 1, 322 & 202** – These improvements include widening 1/322 between Conchester Highway and 202 to three lanes in each direction, traffic signal upgrades or modifications at all intersections and the addition of a right-turn lane on northbound 202 at Route 1. Construction commenced at the end of March and will last 6 to 7 months.
- **Spring Valley and Brinton Lake Roads** – These improvements include storm sewer installation and road reconstruction of Brinton Lake Road between the Wawa and Spring Valley Road, and Spring Valley Road between Brinton Lake Road and Temple Road. Traffic calming measures will be installed. Several road closures will occur in the spring and summer. The Township will ensure the road and detour is properly posted, and will notify adjacent neighborhoods (via the respective Homeowners Associations) prior to road closings. Construction is anticipated to begin May/June.
- **Applied Card Loop Road** – The completion of the Applied Card Loop Road is currently in the planning stages. This loop road will extend the existing Applied Card Drive to Route 202. This project is in the planning stages.
- **Temple Road** – This project is currently in the planning stages, and includes road reconstruction, widening and drainage improvements to Temple Road between the school district entrance and the Meadow Run neighborhood. This project is anticipated to occur late this summer.
- **Traffic Calming: Temple and Spring Valley Roads, Marshall Court and Morris Drive** – This project is currently in the planning stages, with construction anticipated to begin this summer.
- **Emergency Pre-emption, Fire Station, Concord Road** – This project, to install emergency pre-emption devices for the fire station on Concord Road, is currently being reviewed and permitted by Penn DOT, and will be bid on in the spring.

Historical Society: Concord Hometown

Concord Township is home to so many special places, people, and ideas, that it is impossible to do them justice in this brief space. But to give readers a sense of Concord's place in the larger scene, we'll try. We'll try, because without special efforts to keep it, Concord's historical identity, 325 years in the making, is fading with every new roadway and traffic light. Why does that matter, you ask? It matters because hometowns are essential to who we are and how we live.

Everyone wants a great hometown. But for Concord's children today, indeed for all who live here, the idea of Concord Township as hometown barely exists. Why?

First, and most importantly, because over five post offices serve Concord residents and businesses. No wonder so many of us don't know where we live. And most of us are "too busy" to participate in Township-wide events. What's a community to do?

One remedy: Let folks know about the place. Check your "hometown" knowledge about Concord: Do you know that Concord was founded in 1683 (we're 325 years old next year), and that Concord is home to the oldest, original, operating grist mill in the U.S.? That the third paper mill in Pennsylvania operated at Ivy Mills? Do you know that the U.S. mushroom industry began in Concord or that cream cheese produced on Concord Road became known as Philadelphia Cream Cheese or that the Maplewood Institute on Baltimore Pike was one of the first co-ed schools in Pennsylvania? There's much more backyard history here.

The old and the new are all summed up in the new Township car magnet - a green and white emblem with a flourishing tree in the center. The tree represents not just all greenery and history preserved here, but the ancient trees in our township that remain standing, some from the time of William Penn, that are on our Historic Resources Inventory. The old, the new, and our celebration of both are what make Concord a special hometown. Car magnets are on sale at the Township building and at Newlin Crist Mill, for \$5 each.



Another important remedy to the "no hometown" feel is for everyone to support community programs and help out when you can: Park & Rec, Rachel Kohl Library, Fire Company, schools, and not least, Concord Township Historical Society!

The Board of Supervisors asked the Historical Commission to make recommendations on Township-owned historic structures. The commission's task force recommended building a post office on the former site of the Concordville Railroad Station. At the present time, we have numerous post offices that service us. Having our own post office and a rural delivery service would restore the identity of Concord Township. (See *Historic Concord on page 8*)

Stop by the Library to pick up a flyer with additional details about our events and activities. All summer programs are free, but some have limited space - be sure to register early.

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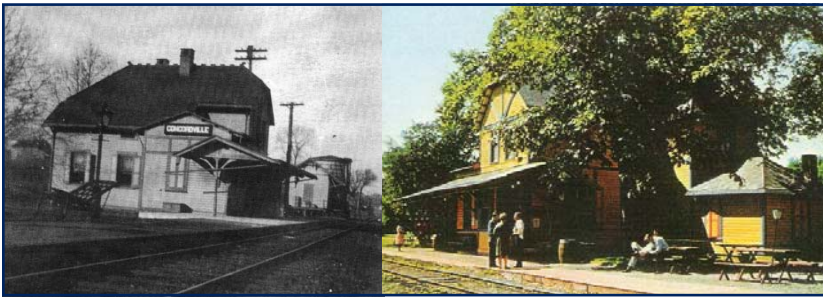

Historic Concord

Concordville Railroad Station
Station & Concord Roads



As early as 1848, there was interest in having a railroad line through Concord Township. Meetings were held with the Baltimore and Philadelphia Railroad Company and the Philadelphia and Baltimore Central Railroad Company. These two companies merged in 1854 and a line through Concord became a reality. Chalkley Harvey, George Martin, Casper Sharpless, James Mark Willcox and Isaac Watkin were the promoters.

Service began by the end of 1859. This brought rapid growth in the area of the Village of Ward on Concord Road: Alexander Scott's Lumber Yard, then Richards and Schrader's Lumber Yard and today, the Glen Mills Restaurant.

The Concordville Railroad Station was constructed in 1886 on Station Road, just west of Concord Road, and operated until April 30, 1948, when passenger service stopped. The freight line continued until September 1971, when Tropical Storm Agnes washed out parts of the track and several bridges.

From July 1, 1967 until November 2, 1968, an excursion train operated between the Concordville Station and the Wawa Station. However, by 1980, vandalism and fires had destroyed the Concordville Railroad Station.

July 19, The Homegrown String Band brings high-energy traditional and original American roots music to Delaware County. A 21st century incarnation of the traditional family band (they've been compared to the legendary Carter Family), this quartet of acoustic musicians from Rocky Point, NY utilizes unique instrumentation, percussive flatfoot dancing, and varied musical influences to take their audiences on a rollicking ride through the sounds of American music. When you wash your car, all the soap, scum and oily grit runs along the curb and into storm drains and the Schuylkill and Delaware Rivers. This causes pollution which is unhealthy for people and fish. Please wash your car on grass or gravel instead of the street or your driveway. Or better yet, take it to a car wash where the water gets treated and recycled.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- 💧 Wash your car on a grassy area if possible, so the ground can filter the water naturally. Use soap sparingly. Try to use non-phosphate detergents.
- 💧 Use a hose that is high pressure, low volume and has a pistol grip or trigger nozzle to save water. Wash one section of the car at a time and rinse it quickly.
- 💧 When you're done, empty your bucket of soapy water down the sink, not in the street.
- 💧 Best of all, take your car to a commercial car wash, especially if you plan to clean the engine or the bottom of the car. Most car washes reuse water several times before sending it for treatment at a sewage treatment plant.
